

The Sebastians are a dynamic and vital musical ensemble specializing in music of the baroque and classical eras. Lauded as "everywhere sharp-edged and engaging" (The New York Times), the Sebastians have also been praised for their "well-thought-out articulation and phrasing" (Early Music Review) and "elegant string playing... immaculate in tuning and balance" (Early Music Today). Their 2018 unconducted St. Matthew Passion with TENET Vocal Artists was called "shattering" and "a performance of uncommon naturalness and transparency." Recent seasons have included dozens of originally conceived programs, including collaborations with poets, choreographers, and actors; a musical installation in the Cathedral of St.



John the Divine; programs dealing with musical "immigration" and nationalism; and major works of J.S. Bach. The Sebastians are currently in residence at the Yale Collection of Musical Instruments. Bassist **Nathaniel Chase** performs a wide range of music, from period performance with the Sebastians, Trinity Baroque Orchestra, and Early Music New York, to orchestral repertoire with the Riverside Symphony and Allentown Symphony, and new music with Ensemble LPR and Ensemble Échappé. He performed on

Broadway in the critically acclaimed production of *Farinelli and the King* with countertenor lestyn Davies. He is a graduate of the New England Conservatory and the Yale School of Music, where he was a winner of the 2010 Woolsey Hall Concerto Competition.



Grace Copeland is a producer/director of theatrical media based in New York City. To support her own creative endeavors, she is a freelance theater photographer and dance filmmaker. Her producing credits include *IJM* x Broadway: Until All Are Free, Ryan Dunn: A Seasonal Playlist, the Hephzibah House commercial, Dance In Development, and

Unpolished Movement portraits. Her photo exhibition credits include Rockefeller Center and Moshava Art Gallery. She is beginning her second year as an artist-in-residence at Greenhouse Arts Center in Harlem. Her current art side quests include painting, tap dancing, and adapting her favorite essay into a dance play. She hopes to always create in a way that loves the artist more than the art.



Violinist **Nicholas DiEugenio** has been heralded for his "excellent...evocative" playing (*The New York Times*), full of "rapturous poetry" (*American Record Guide*). Nicholas is in-demand as a soloist, chamber musician, and ensemble leader, creating powerful shared experiences in music ranging from early baroque to

contemporary commissions. His award-winning album *Unraveling Beethoveen* with pianist and wife Mimi Solomon was released in 2018 by New Focus Recordings, and other recordings include the *Complete Violin Sonatas of Robert Schumann* (Musica Omnia) as well as a tribute to Pulitzer prizewinner Steven Stucky (New Focus). Nicholas is a core member of the Sebastians as well as

Hannah Fox is a Brooklyn-based software engineer, visual artist and "visual DJ," or "VJ." Although she is a lifelong visual artist, she stumbled upon projections and VJ'ing entirely by accident in 2021; she began running tech as a hobby for her favorite music venue, where the owner eventually taught her how to make projection visuals

for DJ shows. It stuck, and Hannah now owns her own projectionarts business, specializing in emotional, atmospheric visuals and custom animations. She performs for venues, collectives and shows all over the city, and has VJ'd for artists such as Paul van Dyk and Fred Again—but her favorite shows will always be with and for her friends.



Ramuel Galarza is a Puerto Rican photographer and filmmaker living in New York City. He grew up in the swamps of Gainesville, Florida. Since the age of eight, he would experiment with photography, capturing family moments and telling a story through the lens. During his studies at Florida State University, friends and

colleagues began to take notice of his work and requested him to take their portraits. So began his expansion into studio portrait photography where he would study tutorials and classes online, learning about set design, strobe lighting, and analog photography. Following the successful run of his first solo exhibition titled "Closeted," Ramuel is incessantly creating new work for his second show that will premiere in Spring 2024.



Keyboardist and conductor **Jeffrey Grossman** specializes in vital, engaging performances of music of the past, through processes that are intensely collaborative and historically informed. As the artistic director of the Sebastians, Jeffrey has directed Bach's *Passions* and Handel's *Messiah* from the organ and harpsichord,

and he is a frequent performer with TENET, the Saint Paul Chamber Orchestra, and numerous other ensembles across the country. Recent seasons include his conducting operas of Haydn and Handel with Juilliard Opera, leading Monteverdi's *Vespers* with the Green Mountain Project in New York and Venice, and conducting a workshop of a new Vivaldi pastiche opera for the Metropolitan Opera. A native of Detroit, Michigan, he holds degrees from Harvard, Juilliard, and Carnegie Mellon University. Jeffrey teaches performance practice at Yale University.

Daniel S. Lee thrives in the intersection of the arts and spirituality. His work involves redefining the roles of sacred and secular music with regards to their intention, function, and venue. Praised by *The New York Times* as "soulful" and "ravishing," he performs as a period violinist and leader with various ensembles throughout the United

States and Europe, including his own, the Sebastians. He currently serves as the concertmaster for the Providence Baroque Orchestra (RI) and the resident baroque orchestra at the Washington National Cathedral (DC). He performs on various historical instruments and fosters ongoing collaborative research with luthier Karl Dennis (Warren, RI) and bowmaker David Hawthorne (Waltham, MA). When not traveling and performing, he splits his time between Willard, MO, where he pastors a Presbyterian Church (USA) congregation, and New Haven, CT, where he teaches early music at the Yale School of Music. Born in Chicago and raised in Seoul, South Korea, and in NYC, Daniel is equally (un)fluent in Korean and in English. He identifies himself as ethnically a New Yorker. He enjoys learning about different cultures and is a student of ancient languages.



NYC-based modern and baroque violinist **Isabelle Seula Lee** performs throughout the US, Europe, and Asia. She is a new member of Philharmonia Baroque, where she frequently appears as concertmaster, and regularly plays with ensembles including New York Baroque Incorporated, Trinity Baroque Orchestra, and Bach Collegium

Japan. Isabelle has collaborated with early music specialists including Richard Egarr, Monica Huggett, Lars Ulrik Mortensen, Rachel Podger, and Masaaki Suzuki. She made her debut at age eleven as a concerto soloist with the Tele-Radio Symphony Orchestra in Saint Petersburg; she has appeared as a soloist with numerous other orchestras in Russia, Estonia, and the US. She holds degrees from Lynn University, the Juilliard School, and the Yale School of Music, studying with Elmar Oliveira, Hyo Kang, Naoko Tanaka, Robert Mealy, Monica Huggett, Cynthia Roberts, and Elizabeth Blumenstock.



Born and raised in New Orleans, **Rachel Monteleone** has always had a flair for the creative. From ballet to the NBA to the Super Bowl with Beyoncé, Rachel's expansive performance career inevitably led her to New York, where she first picked up a camera. She imbues her photography with her knowledge of lines, dynamic movement,

balance, and spirit—capturing the true essence of her subjects through her vivid and colorful images.



Izaiha Rosado is a full-time photographer, videographer, and graphic designer. As the Creative Director for both The Grace Place NYC and its nonprofit counterpart, The Dream Center NYC, he is privileged to shape creative visions. In every project, his overarching goal is to illuminate the sanctity of life, unravel the wonders of our world, and

celebrate the intrinsic beauty embedded in humanity. Through the lens of his artistry, he strives to weave narratives that transcend the ordinary, inviting viewers into a profound exploration of the extraordinary facets of life.



Hailed for his "scampering virtuosity" (American Record Guide) and "superb" playing (The New York Times), cellist Ezra Seltzer is the principal cellist of the Trinity Baroque Orchestra, New York Baroque Incorporated, and Early Music New York and a founding member of the Sebastians. He has frequently appeared as guest principal

cellist of Musica Angelica and the Saint Paul Chamber Orchestra, where he earned praise for his "delicate elegance and rambunctious spirit" (*Twin Cities Pioneer Press*). He attended Yale University, where he received his Bachelor of Arts in history and Master of Music in cello, and graduated from the inaugural class of Juilliard's historical performance program.



Joshua Stauffer is a restless creative who performs music from over four centuries on a variety of plucked instruments. Recent projects in his eclectic calendar include a collaboration with Riannon Giddens and Francesco Turrisi (theorbo), an opera by Doug Balliett (electric guitar), and a baroque folk record with Rebecca Scout Nelson

(lutes and guitars). Joshua studied lute at The Juilliard School, classical guitar at the Cleveland Institute of Music, and jazz guitar at the University of the Arts in Philadelphia. Outside of music, Joshua writes open source software and is an avid marathoner.



Violinist **Beth Wenstrom**'s chamber playing has been praised as "elegant and sensual, stylishly wild" (*The New Yorker*) and is an original member of the "eclectic and electrifying early-music ensemble," ACRONYM (*Boston Globe*). As a soloist and concertmaster, she has performed with Trinity Wall Street Baroque Orchestra, New

York Baroque Incorporated, the Sebastians, and TENET, as well as the Washington Cathedral Baroque Orchestra. She has also performed in Apollo's Fire, Orchestra of the Age of Enlightenment, the Boston Early Music Festival Orchestra, and other ensembles throughout the country and abroad. Beth serves as string coach for the baroque ensemble at SUNY Stony Brook and has taught violin and baroque orchestra as a recurring guest teacher at Oberlin Conservatory. She has also coached at Cornell University, Rutgers University, Vassar College, as well as summer institutes such as the Baroque Performance Institute at Oberlin and the Amherst Early Music Festival.
